Since two Sections of the Report were issued each month for so many years of the STOP ERA battle (one on ERA and another on a different subject), this is actually the 317th separate *Phyllis Schlafly Report* (not counting Eagle Forum Newsletters).

As we begin our 18th Anniversary Year next month, we want to say "thanks" to our members/subscribers who have been with us since our first issue in August 1967—and to welcome the thousands of others who have joined our movement along the way. The Phyllis Schlafly Report has been an essential tool in the growth of the conservative and pro-family movements, providing concise and accurate information on timely topics of national concern. It already had a national reputation for reliability and newsworthiness by the time STOP ERA was founded in 1972.

This Report is the lifeline of communication for Eagle Forum (our national membership lobbying organization), for Eagle Forum Education & Legal Defense Fund (our 501(c)(3) educational organization), for Eagle Forum PAC (our political action committee), and for dozens of other organizations that function under other names but share our goals and follow our leadership. This month we share with you some pictures from various recent conferences sponsored by Eagle Forum and Eagle Forum Education & Legal Defense Fund.




Equal Pay for Comparable Worth

was the title of a two-day conference sponsored by Eagle Forum Education & Legal Defense Fund on October 17-18, 1983, at the Vista International Hotel in Washington, D.C. The 19 speakers included busi-

nessmen, legislators, economists, academicians, and lawyers. The proceedings, published under the title Equal Pay for UNequal Work, have become the major reference book on this subject.






