

FDR was one of the first Democrats to try court-packing when the Supreme Court threatened his liberal New Deal. He was attacked by both parties and the failed attempt was a crushing defeat.

The Constitution does not set the number of Supreme Court justices, but the number of justices hasn't changed for one hundred fifty years.



Advocates of court-packing admit they want to make the court more liberal.

Aaron Belkin, director of "Pack the Courts" says we need court-packing to "save the Green New Deal" and to "nullify" votes of Justices Gorsuch and Kavanaugh.

Americans are opposed to court-packing because they see it as cheating the system.

Even liberal Supreme Court Justice Stephen Breyer opposes it.
