


Fact Sheet:

Comprehensive Sex Education

Comprehensive Sex Education (CSE) is hard to define because different people use it to mean different things.

It can include content that is pro-LGBT, is pro-abortion, treats abstinence until marriage as an unrealistic goal, or teaches young people to obtain abortion/contraceptives without their parents' knowledge.





No one denies that abstinence is the only 100% safe way to avoid unintended pregnancy and sexually transmitted diseases (STDs).

That's why proponents of CSE have started calling it "safer sex" instead of "safe sex."

CSE is built on the idea that condoms prevent STDs and pregnancy. Yet, condoms only prevent pregnancy and HIV 85% percent of the time over a year of typical use. Condoms only prevent diseases like gonorrhea, herpes, syphilis and chlamydia 50% of the time.

CSE is being pushed by the United Nations. Their guidelines call for abstinence being presented as "only one of a range of choices available to young people." Here's a list of the "Key Ideas" they want taught to **5-8 year old children**:

"Gender inequality is often reflected in the roles and responsibilities of family members." "It is important to understand the difference between biological sex and gender."

"There are effective medical treatments that can help people living with HIV."

Phyllis Schlafly said parents should be "demanding that the classroom sex ed teach abstinence-until-marriage as the expected behavior instead of 'comprehensive' immorality."
